Learning To Teach

Acts 18:18-28

These were no seminary professors, no trained pastors, nor professional evangelists. They could hardly be high school graduates for all we know, and yet here were the manual labor, husband-and-wife pair of Priscilla and Aquila, training this newcomer to be a preacher. Apollos, a Jew visiting Ephesus, was highly educated with a "thorough knowledge of the scriptures" (Act 18:25) and had already begun to preach about Christ's coming, but his knowledge was incomplete. He had the passion but not the right information about Christ. Priscilla and Aquila saw Apollos's heart and brought him under their wing.

Imagine if everyone with the heart for Christ would realize that their discipleship credentials come not from education alone but from a relationship with him. Many Christians are self-conscious about their lack of training—but from which college did the apostle Peter graduate?

The truth is that we learn from the Lord and from others how to teach, just as we learn from them how to live. The irony is that by discipling others, we ourselves learn more about the Lord than what was possible before.
